20 Questions
Every Parent
Should Ask About
Campus Safety



Introduction

Safety remains one of the most important considerations for families evaluating a university.

Beyond academic quality and campus amenities, parents want confidence that their child will be supported, guided, and cared for throughout their university experience.

When parents ask about safety, they're looking for more than statistics or standard protocols. They're trying to understand how an institution operates day-to-day, how prepared it is for a range of scenarios, and how well it connects students with the help they need.

The following 20 questions reflect the themes most commonly raised by families as they explore how universities approach student safety, wellbeing, communication, and community culture.

I. Everyday Safety and Response

1. How can my student quickly reach help or report a concern from anywhere — on or off campus?

Parents want reassurance that their student has straightforward, immediate access to assistance, regardless of location.

2. How are emergency alerts and safety updates communicated to students and families in real time?

Clear, reliable communication is essential in urgent situations. Families value systems that allow timely updates and guidance.

3. How visible and approachable are campus safety officers to students day-to-day?

Visibility and approachability help students feel more comfortable seeking help and building trust with safety staff.

4. What options exist for safe transport, escorts, or support when moving around campus after dark?

Parents look for support services that prioritize student mobility during evenings and late hours.

5. How do campus and community responders coordinate during major incidents?

Collaboration between university teams and local responders helps ensure efficient and coordinated action.

Across the US, UK and Australia, independent surveys show that campus safety consistently ranks alongside cost and academic quality as a top-three factor for parents when they help their son or daughter choose a university.



II. Wellbeing, Prevention, and Support



6. How does the university support mental health, wellbeing, and early intervention?

Families expect a proactive and accessible approach to mental health resources and wellness programs.

7. How are reports of harassment, assault, or discrimination handled — and what care pathways exist?

Transparency, sensitivity, and clarity around support options are key to maintaining student trust.

8. How do you identify and support students who may be vulnerable, isolated, or at higher risk?

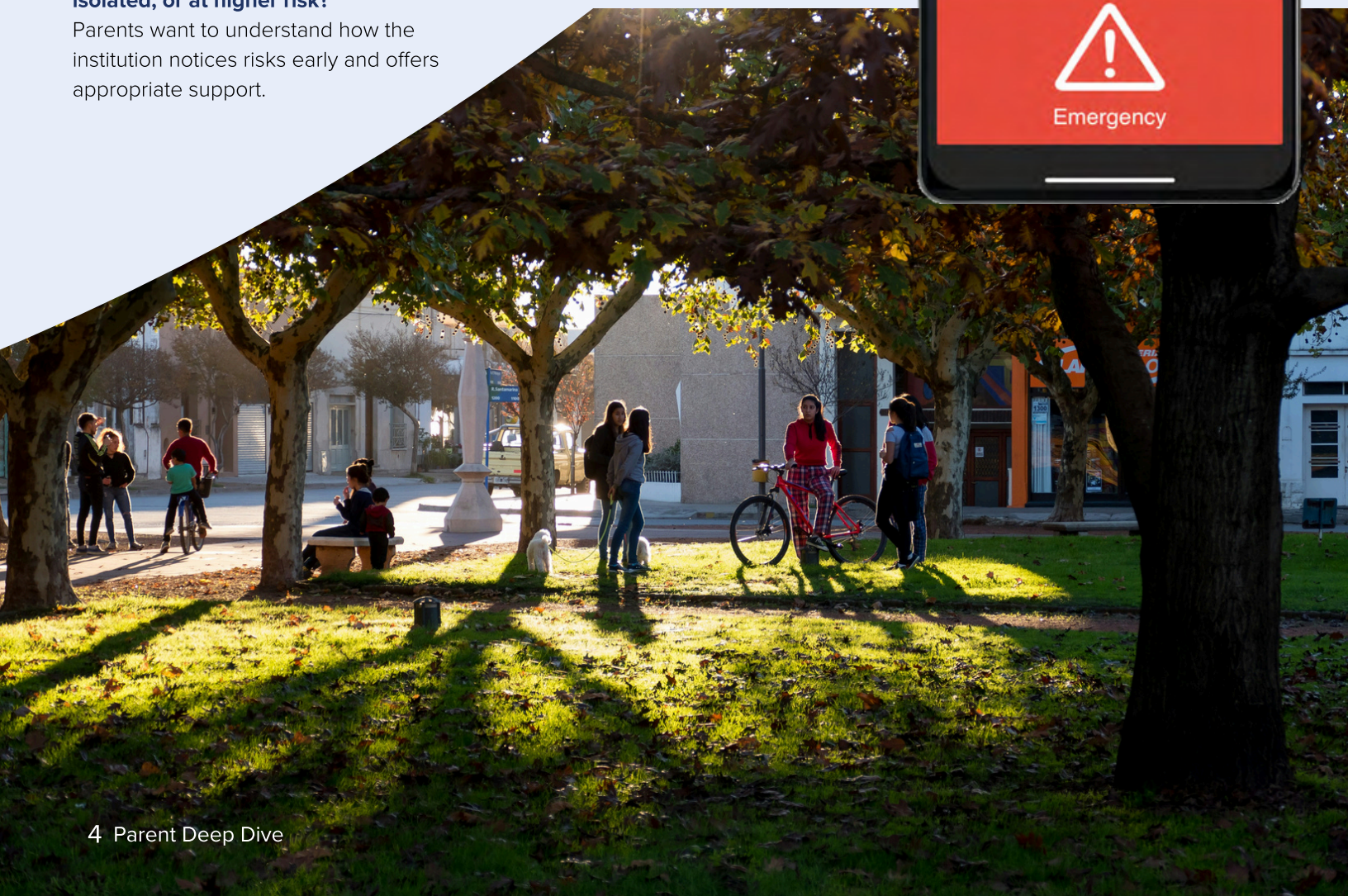
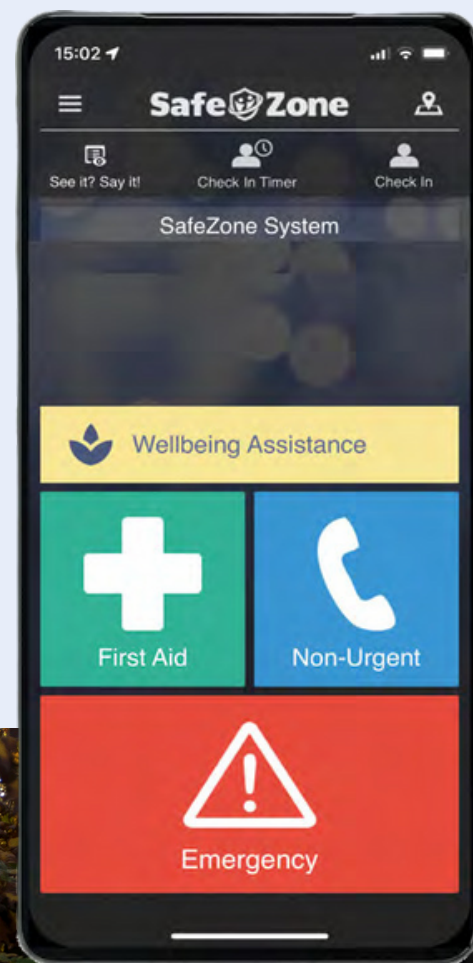
Parents want to understand how the institution notices risks early and offers appropriate support.

9. How are safety and wellbeing services staffed after hours, weekends, and holidays?

Round-the-clock assistance helps ensure that students can get support whenever they need it.

10. What kind of safety orientation or ongoing education does my student receive?

Regular education reinforces student awareness and encourages responsible decision-making.





III. Trust, Transparency, and Communication

11. Who can I contact if I'm concerned about my student's safety or wellbeing?

Parents appreciate clear points of contact and accessible support channels.

12. How do you ensure student privacy while still providing rapid responses during emergencies?

Balancing privacy with emergency response is central to responsible safety practices.

13. Is there an anonymous or discreet way for students to report issues or ask for help?

Anonymous options support students who may feel uncertain or uncomfortable coming forward openly.

14. How do you foster a community culture where students look out for one another?

Families value campus cultures that encourage shared responsibility, awareness, and mutual care.

15. How do you handle false alarms or system misuse while maintaining trust in your safety tools?

Parents want confidence that systems are reliable, well-managed, and taken seriously.

In recent UK polling, safety and wellbeing were one of parents' top three fears about university life, and Unifrog's data show safety and location are second only to accommodation quality in parent priorities.



IV. Systems, Partnerships, and Accountability

16. What safety and access controls protect residence halls and critical facilities?

A secure campus environment is essential to student peace of mind and parental confidence.

17. What partnerships exist with local law enforcement, healthcare, and community responders?

Strong external relationships help ensure effective coordination during emergencies or complex situations.

18. What happens if an incident occurs off campus — in housing, travel programs, or internships?

Parents want to know how support extends beyond university property.

19. When was the last time your emergency response plan was tested, and what lessons did you learn?

Regular evaluation and improvement demonstrate a commitment to preparedness.

20. How do you measure and communicate the effectiveness of your safety programs?

Meaningful reporting and assessment help families understand how the institution evaluates and strengthens its approach.

From Fragmentation to Unity: A Path Forward



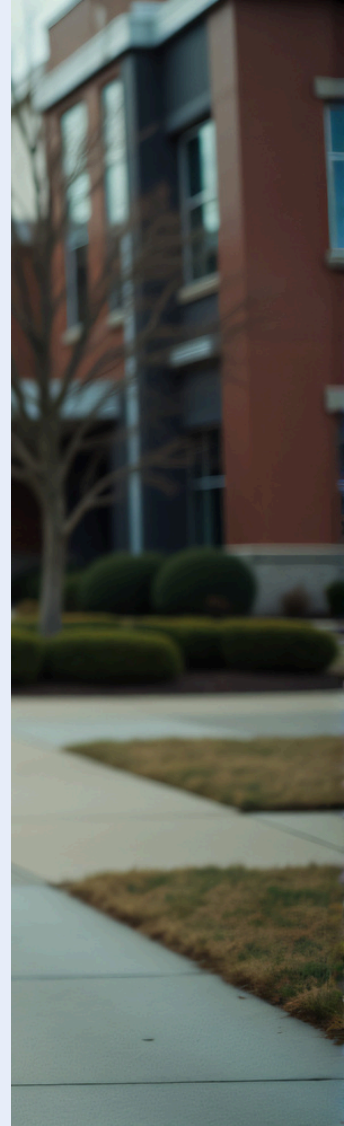
Many universities are recognizing that using multiple, disconnected systems for safety and wellbeing can create gaps in communication and coordination. A unified approach allows institutions to simplify processes, reduce complexity, and enhance clarity during both everyday operations and emergencies.

- Consistent access to help anywhere students study, live, or travel
- Real-time visibility and coordination for safety and response teams

3. Does your current campus safety strategy reflect the expectations of today's parents, who increasingly demand real-time transparency, rapid response capability, and clear communication?

4. How are you measuring the impact of safety perception on application yield, enrollment conversion, and student retention—and is campus safety represented in those metrics?

5. In what ways are you empowering your campus safety or police department to contribute directly to institutional priorities such as recruitment, retention, wellbeing, and reputation?

6. How confident are you that parents understand your university's safety capabilities before arriving on campus—and are you losing prospective students simply because this story isn't being told?

7. Are your safety systems modern, integrated, and proactive—or are outdated processes creating hidden risks that could undermine parental trust and institutional brand value?

8. What investments or innovations in safety would most reassure parents, improve student confidence, and differentiate your university from peer institutions?

9. How is safety leadership included in strategic conversations at cabinet level, and does your current model ensure they have the voice—and resources—needed to meet rising expectations?

10. If a parent asked you today, “Why is this campus safer than the others my child is considering?”—would your institution have a clear, compelling, evidence-based answer?
